
Communication flow chart

News from year 6 Mrs Rowlandson writes..

We hope you enjoyed our assembly this week on the theme of *peace*. Additionally, in honour of Remembrance Day, we have focused on writing linked to WWI. In English, we analyzed the symbolism and imagery in the poem In Flanders Fields by John McCrae, and we started using our own imagery to create powerful and atmospheric descriptions of Life in the Trenches, which we will continue next week.


In art, we learned about the artist Henry Moore, focusing on his pieces depicting people sheltering in the underground tube stations during WWII. In maths, we have started our fractions topic by revising how to simplify fractions, place them on a number line, and compare and order them.


In computing, we continued learning how to create 3D shapes using Tinkercad—we learned how to duplicate 3D objects, hand-draw objects to create our own personalized name badge, and use placeholders to create holes before designing our own desk tidy.

For RE, we created advertisements in pairs to promote a Christian pilgrimage, and in French, we learned mathematical terms such as numbers and operations.

In science, we labelled the key parts of the eye and learned about their role in enabling us to see. Finally, in dance this half term, we are learning how to perform 1940s -style dances; this week, we kicked off with The Charleston-a dance that originated in the 1923 Broadway musical Runnin' Wild, influenced by African American roots after the Great War.









News from year 5 Mr Burkey Writes..

Last week, Year 5 completed their DT Viking longship models. The brief was to

design and make a model that could be used for educational purposes to teach others about Viking longships. The process began by looking at different styles of models already in use, examining whether or not they were effective and making notes of the best designs. The children then created their own designs based on this, labelling them with measurements, materials and parts. We began making the models by stencilling around a template, cutting out four cardboard parts and stapling these together. Each part was covered in masking tape and painted.

The children then measured and sawed the pole used for the mast, creating a holding bridge that was placed inside the ship to keep the mast stable. They then stitched together two pieces of fabric to make a sail, added their own Viking designs and attached it to the top of the mast. Finally, everyone designed and painted their own shields, which were attached to the sides of the ship, then added any extra embellishments as they saw fit.



This was a complicated process involving many skills: researching, designing, sewing, painting, sawing wood, stencilling, cutting and attaching by various means. The end result showed a great deal of care and precision and the children should be very proud of their work. Special thanks to Fiona and Ayisha for helping the children to sew together the sails.

At the start of this half term, Year 5 began a new Power of Reading novel, 'Stombreaker' by Anthony Horowitz. The class has started designing their own spy gadgets, which they will now write about in a piece of persuasive writing, aiming to persuade other spies to make a purchase. As an added extra bit of fun, many of the children have found letters containing secret spy missions hidden around the school. These missions involve different tasks, some of

which are puzzle solving activities, while others are more physical, centering around finding objects hidden around school.

In a link to this spy topic, in Science we have been learning about forces, including gravity. This week, the children took part in a test to find out which material would make the best parachute for a spy. We constructed the parachutes out of different types of fabric, then tested them by standing on a seat and dropping them in a timed test. The parachute drop was filmed and replayed in slow motion on the big screen to confirm the winner



## Achievement for children Mental Health Service team updates:

Thank you to everyone who joined us before half term for our coffee morning hosted by the Mental Health Support Team (MHST), where we focused on understanding and managing anxiety in children. It was a valuable session, filled with practical insights and advice for parents and carers on how to recognize signs of anxiety and provide effective support at home.

During the session, the MHST shared useful strategies for helping children manage anxious feelings, such as relaxation techniques, building resilience, and creating a supportive environment. Attendees also had the chance to ask questions, share experiences, and learn more about the resources available through Achieving for Children to support mental health and wellbeing.

We hope those who attended found it helpful and informative. If you were unable to attend but would like more information on managing anxiety in children, here are some <u>useful documents</u> to support you at home.






Mental Health Service Team


