What is SIAMS?

SIAMS is a Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS). It focuses on how well we

On the day, the inspector will spend time talking to children, staff, governors, and parents, as well as

observing lessons, collective worship, and other parts of school life. They'll be looking at how our vision and ethos shape our daily practices and make a difference to the experiences of our pupils.

We see this as a chance to celebrate all the things that make our school special, as well as to reflect on how we can continue to grow and improve. We're really proud of the way our values of faith, hope and love guide everything we do, and we look forward to sharing this with the inspector on Thursday 6th February.

Bishop Wand and St Mary's Hampton trip to St Paul's Cathedral

Yesterday, Mrs. Das-Mahon and Rev. Teri-Anne accompanied a group of Year 5 and 6 pupils to St. Paul's Cathedral to observe a sacred service. They were joined by numerous Church of England schools from across London, coming together in unity and reverence. The children witnessed a beautiful banner parade, participated in the uplifting hymn singing, and were moved by the prayers and stories shared by Rev. Lusa Nsenga-Ngoy, the Bishop of Willesden. Year 4's Dirty Digestion Experience!

This week, our Year 4 children took part in an exciting and educational visit to Bishop Wand School as part of the Little People, Limited Dreams Programme. The focus of their trip? A hands-on (and sometimes stomachchurning!) journey through the digestive system, fittingly named Dirty Digestion.





The children explored the entire digestion process, from start to finish. One of the highlights of the session was testing different foods for starch using dimple trays – a great opportunity for our young scientists to see food reactions in action! They were also warmly welcomed by our Sixth Form students, who were thrilled to see them, especially those who regularly visit St. Mary's to read and support our children.

However, the most unforgettable (and slightly off putting) part of the experience was watching a Happy Meal get blended into a stomachlike mush – a moment that definitely raised a few eyebrows! The process of peristalsis (where the intestines squeeze and push food along) was demonstrated in a very visual way, showing how nutrients are absorbed and liquids are removed before waste is finally expelled. The grand finale? The 'removal' of the food from the



digestive process - a moment that left quite a few faces looking rather disapproving!

In addition to exploring digestion, the students also investigated the effects of carbon dioxide, acid, and sugar on teeth. Using an experiment where a 'tooth' was



placed in acid, they observed firsthand how different substances can cause decay and damage. This eye-opening activity reinforced the importance of good oral hygiene and healthy eating habits in a way that really stuck with them!

Overall, it was a fantastic and engaging learning experience, helping our students understand the wonders of the human body in a way they will never forget! A big thank you to Bishop Wand School and our amazing Sixth Formers for making this such a memorable day.



Year 1

A Week of Learning and Creativity!

It has been a busy and exciting week for our Year 1 children as they prepare for their upcoming class assembly next week. Their assembly is inspired by the beautiful story *Guess How Much I Love You*, which they have been exploring in English.

In addition to their preparations, they have started a new book, *Here We Are* by Oliver Jeffers. Inspired by the story, the children have created informative leaflets about life on Earth, showcasing their understanding of our world. They have also tapped into their musical creativity, composing and writing their own songs using noun phrases—a fantastic way to blend language and music!

In RE, the children have continued their study of Judaism, focusing this week on synagogues—what they look like, their importance, and what happens inside them.

Maths has been all about problem-solving, as the children tackled word and picture problems, using tens to help with addition and subtraction and learning different ways to do this.

Meanwhile, in art, they are continuing their printmaking journey. This week, they experimented with plasticine, pressing different materials into it to create unique and textured prints.

It's been wonderful to see their enthusiasm and creativity shine in so many areas of learning.

Year 2

A Week of Discovery, Creativity, and Movement!

Year 2 has had an exciting and engaging week, full of **new learning experiences** across subjects.

In maths, the children have been exploring division, learning how to use the division sign and deepening

their understanding of the relationship between multiplication and division. Through hands-on activities with concrete and pictorial resources, they have been practicing sharing and creating equal groups, helping to build a solid foundation for future times tables mastery.

In English, we have continued working with our key text for this half term, *Winter Sleep* by Sean Taylor, Alex Morss, and Cinyee Chiu. The children have been developing their comprehension skills, using inference and deduction to gain deeper insight into the main characters, Granny Sylvie and the boy. As part of their learning, they have been planning and



writing a letter home from the boy's perspective, and they will bring home their final versions on Friday a wonderful keepsake for you to read and enjoy!

In RE, our focus has been on Judaism and celebrations, with this week's learning centered around Sukkot. The children explored the meaning and traditions of this special festival, helping them to gain a broader understanding of different cultures and beliefs.

Art and history intertwined this week as we looked at architecture and how London's buildings changed after the Great Fire. The children examined the transformation of St Paul's Cathedral, comparing the original structure with the redesigned version by Sir Christopher Wren. Using their art sketchbooks, they explored different architectural styles and created their own sketches inspired by the iconic landmark.

PE on Tuesday was all about HIIT dance! The children worked in groups to choreograph their own high-energy routines, focusing on aerobic exercise, teamwork, and creativity. It was fantastic to see their enthusiasm and cooperation shine through in their performances!
